A Note from the Treasurer

I know we have many new committee chairs so I thought I would provide an overview of how the finances for the guild work.

The membership passes a budget prior to the beginning of each fiscal year (July thru June). That budget is divided into an income budget and an expenditure budget. This is your time to request what you think you will need for the coming year.

The income budget provides our best guess at what our income will be in each of the committee programs and is the basis of what we can spend for the year. These best guesses are based on past years experiences in each of the categories and committee chair requests.

The expense budget provides authority for each committee chair to spend up to the amount in the budget document without obtaining permission from the board and/or membership allowing for smooth administration of our mission. If an expense budget is insufficient to cover the expenses of a program, the committee chair needs to bring a request for expansion to the board for action to increase their budget. They should not exceed their expenditure budget amount without receiving that action from the board.

A "actual vs budget" report is available for each committee chair at the Treasurer's table every month so you can monitor how much you have remaining to spend. The board uses this information to determine how on budget we are and if adjustments are needed. If we do not realize expected income, we may need to adjust expense budgets to stay in line.

The income and expense budgets are independent of one another and balance back to the cash we have available and the amounts we expect to bring in. They are not netted out, meaning that if you bring in more than the budget anticipates you cannot automatically spend the additional funds without seeking approval of the board and/or membership.

Most of our spending is reimbursement based. As a committee chair you can purchase what you need, turn in the receipts and a reimbursement document to the treasurer and receive a check from the guild for reimbursement. These forms are also available at the treasurer's table every meeting.

Funds received for guild functions are turned into the treasurer, accounted for and deposited into the guild account. Envelopes will be provided upon request. (When I remember to bring them to the meetings).

Home Tour – Boutique – Placemats

At the September meeting I will be collecting any placemats that need to be quilted. I will quilt them on my long arm. Typically, a yard of fabric is needed for 4 placemats. I cannot take "pieces" but if you do not have a solid piece of fabric, I can offer an alternative. I have several bolts of blender fabrics in the following colors: Black, red, 2 shades of green, 2 shades of brown, and blue (not navy). I am willing to use my fabric for your placemat backings, but you of course will need the binding material.

I have 4 more sets of interfacing and batting as well as the sewing directions for the scalloped placemats that do not require binding. I will bring them to the meeting. They will be available to those who would like to take them and make some placemats for the Boutique. Linda Brown
